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District Lead Volunteer's Report

We've achieved a lot as a District in the last year which has been great to see!

I was able to visit a number of AGMs and whilst I knew what amazing things our volunteers were putting on for our young people, it really brought home quite how much we do do but we also need to shout about it more!

It was amazing to welcome a number of members to various District teams, including Team Leaders, Squirrels Support and Group Lead Volunteers.

I was delighted with the response we had to the District Development Day, and it was great to see so many people there shaping the direction we take as a District. I personally feel that we have an ambitious but workable plan that if we execute in the right way, we'll take the District forward hugely. The plan underpins nearly everything that we're doing as a District and therefore my thanks go out to all of the District teams who are working hard in the background to make it happen and I'm confident that we'll continue to see positive outputs.

It has however been a very sad year saying goodbye to 1st Houghton, and the formal closure of both Paulerspury Scout Group and the District Scout Band. Whilst these have been extremely difficult decisions, they were unfortunately the right ones for the District to ensure that we could effectively deploy our resources.

We started off 2024 by welcoming 1st Hardingstone into the District which as original members of Castle Ashby, was great to welcome them "back" into the District.

As always, January brought the annual census and we reported a headline growth figure of +13.21% (+14.03% or 149 young people and +10% or 27 adults), this was thanks to Hardingstone joining us with our like for like growth being -3.15%, losing 21 young people and 21 adults.

We last saw a decrease in 2021, and 2015 before that, and although a decrease is not what we want to see, it was positive to see that even on a like for like basis, our Leadership (so adults working in the sections) grew by 4.35%.

I was delighted when I received an email from Pattishall in March saying that they wanted to open a Squirrel Drey, and they had their first meeting in May. Growth will of course remain a priority for us as a District but in a sustainable way, and by focusing on our existing provision too, not just opening new. We have ambitious plans, including open Dreys, so I look forward to seeing these come to fruition.

January, February and March were busy months for the District Programme Team with the Cub Totempole Competition held in January, the Scout Expedition in February and the Beaver Party in March. I was really pleased to be able to visit all 3 events and could see how much the young people enjoyed themselves, so my thanks go to the team for organising these and to the leaders for bringing their young people.

Transformation is ongoing and who knows when we'll see an end, but the resilience of volunteers has shone once again and I know that when the time comes, we'll make it work in the very best way. I was really pleased to see a number of you at the Trustee Workshops that we ran, and we will of course run similar sessions when more changes start to filter through.

We continue to lead the way with training with our eLearning site for both adult volunteers and young leaders being used all across the country, from Scotland to Dorset. Mandatory Ongoing Learning will continue to be a huge focus for the District and whilst this may mean making some hard decisions on occasion, it is the right thing to do to protect our young people.

As I finish writing this report, I want to say a huge thank you to all of the amazing volunteers within Grafton – you all do a wonderful job and even if you don't work directly with young people, you're still enabling them to learn Skills for Life. I've said since the day I took on the role of District Commissioner that we as a District solely exist to support you and make your lives as easy as possible so I urge you to get involved with District meetings and events as without your input, we can't do our job effectively.

Spotley Wood Campsite Report

This year the site has continued to run smoothly, and I would like to start my report by thanking Ken Underwood for all the work he carried out as the previous Warden and for his invaluable support to me taking over as the new warden in November 2023. Thanks also go to Mike Ladd, Jon Owen and Bob Gibson for their help and support. Much appreciated 😊

Bob's help with the booking system has also been gratefully received and we hope bookings continue to improve this coming year. Since April, we have taken 7 bookings, although one of these did have to leave early due to terrible weather and ground conditions. We have another prospective 14 bookings in the diary up to the end of October.

The site is in a much better state both financially and facility wise than it was back in 2005 when Ken first took up post as Spotley Warden and it is great that he will continue to be part of the team for this coming year too.

Drainage work has now been completed and we are hoping that the site will benefit from this in the future. In January, we re-laid the existing pathways and in February, Compton estates, after completing a tree survey, felled relevant trees. This was done prior to nesting season to ensure no damage to any nests that might be built in them.

Fire extinguishers were checked in January 2024, and at the time of writing, we are in the process of arranging PAT testing and required gas safety checks.

Weekly checks and general maintenance are carried out by team members, and we have noted that some of the brick work could do with being re-pointed in the not-too-distant future so we will look into this in the coming year.

Hopefully, groups will continue to make use of Spotley Campsite and all it has to offer. It is an important asset to our District, and we hope more groups can be encouraged to come for a visit in the future.
